

## WELCOME

The Oriental Institute, part of the University of Chicago, is a world-renowned center for research, focused on the study of the ancient Middle East. Our museum houses a major collection of antiquities from the regions of ancient Egypt, Iran, Iraq, Israel, Nubia, Syria, and Turkey, mainly dating from between 10,000 BC–AD 650. These lands were called the “Orient” at the turn of the last century when University of Chicago archaeologists began unearthing many of the artifacts now on view in the museum. Bilingual interactive kiosks and activity cards supply additional information about the exhibits. During your visit, stop at the Suq shop for books about the ancient world and gifts from today’s Middle East.

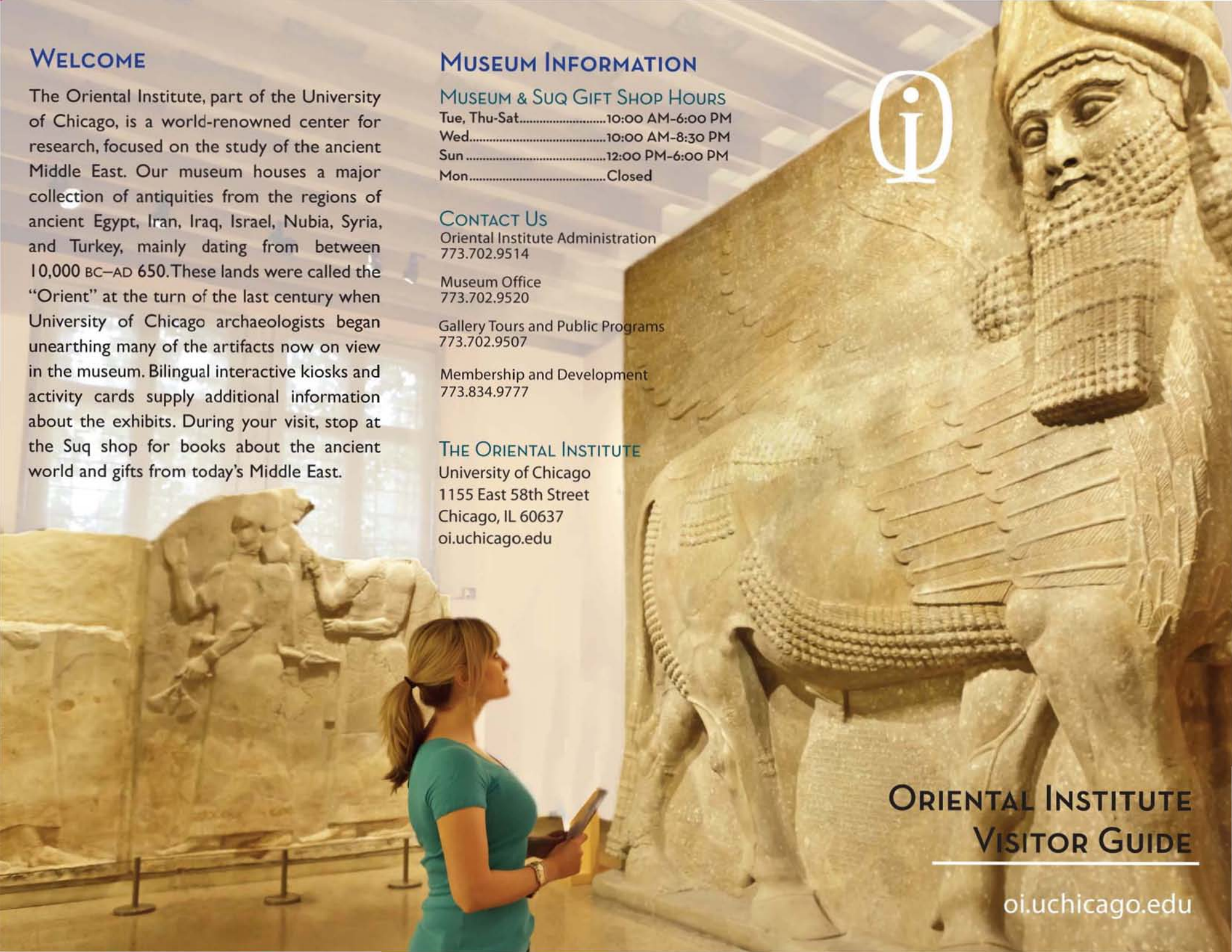

## EGYPT

A colossal statue of King Tut invites you to explore writing, kingship, mummification, and life in ancient Egypt.



## PERSIA (Present-day Iran)

Monumental sculpture, pottery, and metalwork trace the rise of states and empires in ancient Iran.



## NUBIA (Present-day Egypt & Sudan)

Discover 4,000 years of Nubian history through pottery, sculpture, and luxury objects from southern Egypt and Sudan.



## ANATOLIA (Present-day Turkey) AND SYRIA

Pottery, clay tablets, metalwork, and monumental sculptures document the Hittites and their neighbors in ancient Turkey.



## MEGIDDO (Present-day Israel)

Explore the world of the Canaanites and Israelites through objects excavated at Megiddo—Biblical Armageddon.



## ASSYRIA (Present-day Iraq)

See carved reliefs and artifacts from the Assyrian empire and its neighbors.



## KHORSABAD (Present-day Iraq)

A 40-ton sculpture of a human-headed winged bull reigns over the recreation of a courtyard from the palace of Assyrian King Sargon II.
